Historical Context

- Between 1919 and 1926 car ownership in Britain had increased from 70,000 to 1 million
- By 1934, car ownership had doubled again to 2 million and in that year 1,536 cyclists were killed on the roads
- Half a century ago, in 1967, there were 33 cyclists killed on Scotland's roads
- Last year, 2016, there were 8 cyclists killed as a result of road crashes in Scotland
