Introduction

In this guide we'll explain the benefits of becoming a Cycling Friendly Primary School and guide you through the steps to becoming one.

Why cycling? Right now, in Scotland, cycling continues to be a popular travel choice for many. That's because so many of you are seeing the benefits that cycling brings, like improving your health, saving you money and looking after the environment. We all understand the benefits of cycling but the real question is, how do you get more people cycling at your school? Cycling Scotland's Cycling Friendly Primary School Award is designed to help you do just that.

Becoming a Cycling Friendly Primary School Award is recognition of the whole school community effort to increasing cycling at school. The Award is nationally recognised and is a great way for your school to show its commitment to cycling and active travel.

Your role as the school cycle champion is an important one because:

- you will be our main point of contact throughout the awards process
- you will need to motivate and coordinate others

The easiest and quickest way to make changes in your school is to bring together teachers, parents and pupils. It only takes one enthusiastic person to make big changes to your school by encouraging the different parts of your school community to work together. The role of the school cycling champion is essential to achieving the Cycling Friendly Primary School Award.



How to become a Cycling Friendly Primary School

1

•Registration. A member of school staff registers for the Cycling Friendly Award online. A Cycling Friendly assessor will be assiged to assist the school in their journey to becoming Cycling Friendly.

•Assessment. The assigned assessor arranges an onsite or phone assessment, during which the school is assessed against the Cycling Friendly Award criteria and issued with an action plan.

3

 Award. Once the school has acheived the criteria, the assessor awards Cycling Friendly School status. The school receives an award certificate and school gate banner.

4

•Reassessment. After 3 years, the assessor arranges a reassessment to ensure the organisation is still achieving the Cycling Friendly Award crtieria.



Award Criteria

The criteria of the Cycling Friendly Primary School Award fall into three categories: infrastructure; development & promotion. Not all criteria apply equally to every school and this is taken into account during the assessment process.

Bear in mind that you don't need to answer yes to all 11 questions achieve the award.
